The name "Kulshan" was chosen for the name of this Society, because it is the Indian name for Mt. Baker, one of the highest and most picturesque glacial peaks on the Continent. It is 10,750 feet high, and an extinct volcano. The explorer, Vancouver, wrote in 1792 "The high distant land looked like detached islands amongst the lofty Cascade Range. It was discovered by Lieutenant Baker, and in compliment to him renamed it Mt. Baker." A Spanish explorer wrote, "Mt. Baker seemed to personify a great white Friar of Carmel, kneeling with bowed head to Heaven."

Mrs. Longstreth was State Chaplain 1947-1951. Marita Longstreth is Junior State Registrar, and Mrs. Mark Timson is State Recording Secretary. Mrs. W. M. Shepherd was a State Promoter.

PRINCESS ANGELINE SOCIETY, C.A.R.

Princess Angeline Society, Children of the American Revolution, Seattle, was organized February 4, 1948, by Mrs. A. J. Airolldi, organizing President and sponsored by Rainier Chapter, D.A.R. There were twelve organizing members.

The name was chosen to honor the daughter of Chief Seattle. She was known as Princess Angeline, and it is generally believed that she went, alone, at the request of her father, across Puget Sound to warn the white settlers that unfriendly Indians were planning to attack the settlement and massacre the inhabitants. She is buried in Lake View Cemetery, Seattle, in the Henry Yealer family lot.
